Seven players on the green at the time dropped their mallets and ran for the pavillion when the cow burst into the club grounds about 4.00pm.

All the players were charged in turn but no one was hurt.

The cow was later destroyed outside a house in Mason Avenue.

"We had the shock of our lives to see the cow standing on the green," said a player, Mr. J. J. Campbell, of Station Road. "It charged me and then made for three of the ladies. They just made the pavillion before the cow smashed into a wall in front of the door. It slid about six feet before hitting the wall."—P.A.

OTAMUHU CROQUET KACLUB (51)

Pifty - eight years ago, during 1906, the Otahuhu Croquet Club was formed by a group of enthusiasts who commenced play on laud near the railway station.

In 1941 they became affiliated with the Auckland Croquet Association Mr E. West was the first president and Miss Somerville secretary.

Later, the chib moved to their present premises and according to the minutes of the meetings held during those early years there was a real struggle to raise funds.

The croquet club co-operated splendidly with the bowlers and shared expenses. The battle to accurre the present land was a hard one indeed. Women worked aboriously to raise the money and after they had collected enough for the deposit the first world war came along and stopped their efforts for a white.

Finally the two Miss Wingates paid for the property and on completion of the reportment, the property's life was vested in the names of five trustees.




Today, the Otahuhu club is secking new members to learn this game which can be played by all age groups.

Croquet club member Mr J. Campbell said there is a warm welcome to be had and the opportunity for social recreation to anyone who cares to visit the club.




